




Fifth Sunday in Lent

As we approach to the end of our Lenten season, we are reminded of our last opportunity to cooperate with God's graces and his benevolent love. It is He invites us to enter deep into his mystery and look for his unlimited love. In today's gospel, we have the moving account of the encounter between Jesus and the woman caught in adultery. The scribes and the Pharisees brought this woman caught in adultery to Jesus not because they are concerned about morality, but because they want to trap Jesus. If he decided for the death penalty, he would lose the sympathy of the masses who knew him to be kind to sinners. She had expected to be killed, but instead she is set free. She has been brought back to life. Brought back to life like the Israelites out of the bondage and into the promised land. Brought back to life like St. Paul who had persecuted Christians, but now take possessions of by Christ.

The Gospel of today places before us an episode that emphasizes the need to examine ourselves and to avoid passing any judgement on others. Generally, there is a tendency within us to find fault in others and condemn them. Jesus places a bigger challenge before the accusers. He asks them to consider their own actions and their own shortcomings. He tells them to look into themselves before passing any judgement on others. So Jesus, when prodded on by the Pharisees, charges the one who is without sin to cast the first stone. How often we have a double standard for judgment. We have one set for ourselves and quite another for others. We are able to see very clearly the weaknesses and failings of others while we condone the same in ourselves. He turns to her and asks her, "Has no one condemned you?" She said, "No one sir." And Jesus said, "Neither do I condemn you. Go your way and sin no more." The lesson of the story is not that sin is of no importance, or that God does not punish sin, but that God extends mercy to repentant sinners in order that they might turn from their sins.


Survey of Catholic Doctrine Apr 25-May 15 (registration opens Mar 9)

This course will look at some of the major doctrines of the Catholic Church. Participants will come to a better understanding of the Trinity, original sin, church, salvation history, and the communion of saints. We will look at the meaning of magisterium, ecumenism, eschatology, and other Catholic terms.

By the end of the course we will have:

- Understood some arguments for the existence of God.
- Defined revelation as God's communication with us
- Articulated why the Trinity is the central mystery of our Christian faith and life.
- Articulated how Scripture speaks of God as creator
- Described original sin as a condition we are born into where we are inclined toward choosing evil
- Understood Jesus as God's self-revealed
- Understood the role of the Holy Spirit in the life of the Church
- Understood the role of the Church in God's plan of salvation and the relationship of the Catholic Church and other religions
- Articulated how Mary and the saints are models of Christian holiness
- · Described the Church's teachings in the area of eschatology

Justification in Scripture

Justification refers to the way we are saved from the guilt inherited from the sin of Adam and Eve (original sin) and the sins that we have personally committed. Christ's redemptive death achieves the

grace of our salvation. The sanctifying grace of Christ's death is mediated to us through the sacrament of baptism (CCC, 1192), which washes us from our sins and makes us worthy of eternal life. Nevertheless, even though we have faith and are made holy through baptism, if we fail to love God, ourselves, or others, so seriously that we completely close our hearts off to God—who is love—we make ourselves unworthy of eternal life with Him and lose our justification (CCC, 1861; 1 John 5:16-17; 1 John 3:14). In the previous essay, we examined the Church's teaching on justification. In this essay and the next, we will look at the foundation that teaching has in Scripture.

TRULY, TRULY, I SAY TO YOU,

First, understand that **justification is not merely external** to us. It is tempting, though incorrect, to think that justification is only a change in how we are viewed by God. For example, we only

participate in the merit of Jesus' death through our faith, which changes how God views us—no longer as sinners—and so we are made just by God viewing us as just. Rather, justification is "not only the remission of sins but also the sanctification and renewal of the interior man" (CCC, 1989).

Consider these words of Jesus in the Gospel of St. John, "whoever hears my word and believes in the one who sent me has eternal life and will not come to condemnation, but has passed from death to life" (John 5:24; see also John 3:18). This passage can easily be misunderstood to read that justification is only external because it seems to say that faith alone is enough to achieve eternal life. However, this interpretation is not correct because immediately after this verse Jesus also emphasizes that love is necessary to salvation by saying that "those who have done good deeds [are sent] to the resurrection of

life, but those who have done wicked deeds to the resurrection of condemnation" (John 5:29).

Our justification is indeed achieved through faith because faith is the beginning and root of our salvation. Faith is what led us (or our parents) to seek our baptism, the event in which we are simultaneously sanctified (made holy) and justified (Acts 22: 16; Mark 16: 16; John 3:5). However, justification is not merely external because it does not happen apart from the cleansing from sin



(2 Thessalonians 2:13; 2 Corinthians 5: 17; 1) and reception of love into our hearts (1 John 3:14; 1 John 4:20). The idea that we could be justified by faith without hope and love would conflict with numerous passages in scripture that explicitly say that justification also requires hope and love. For example, "[w]hoever does not love remains in death" (1 John 3: 14) and "in hope we are saved" (Romans 8: 24).



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
